
The Edge of the World (U)



PRE SCREENING TALK with Ron Butlin: With readings from Muir's journals, diaries and letters to old friends Ron gives a fascinating insight into John Muir. With an international reputation as a prize-winning novelist, Ron Butlin is also the Edinburgh Makar (poet laureate). In 2009 he was made the first ever Honorary Writing fellow (together with Ian Rankin) at Edinburgh University. Much of his poetry, novels and short stories have been broadcast and translated into over ten languages. He has also written five operas, two of them for Scottish Opera.




